#### **DOG LICENSES**

Did you remember to license your dog by April 1st.

If you did not the Animal Control Officer will be visiting you shortly.

If you no longer own your pet contact the Town, so your name will be removed.



#### CLEANUP OF EXCREMENT

Responsibility for cleanup of excrement. The owner of any animal shall be responsible for the prompt removal of any excreta deposited by his or her animal(s) off the owners premises. Failure to remove such excreta shall be considered a violation of the ordinance.

#### LEASH LAW

Responsibility for Leash Law: "At large" shall be intended to mean off the premises of the owner, and not immediately under the control of the owner or a member of the immediate family either by leash, cord, chain or otherwise. Failure to follow the leash law shall be considered a violation of the ordinance.

# LISTER'S MESSAGE

New Law: Act 73 Now in Effect. Tax exempt property owners are required to provide insurance replacement costs to municipal assessors before April 1<sup>st</sup> of each year. This is an annual filing requirement for all exempt property owners. If the property is uninsured, the owner must provide a written explanation of why it is not insured. This new requirement is effective for 2014 grand lists. The reporting form can be found at http://www.state.vt.us/tax/pdf.word.excel/forms/pvr/CR-001.pdf

Please remember to file your Homestead Declarations (HS-122) by April 15, 2014 to avoid any late penalty fees.

Contact the site operator if you have any questions about what goes in any container or what can be recycled. The metal, construction debris, tire and electronic containers can not to be used until you see the site operator. This is to make sure the proper containers are used and the appropriate fees have been paid. We could incur extra charges at the landfills if we do not comply with their requirements.

#### **Storage Container - Electronics:**

- ➤ The Canaan Transfer Station is a Vermont E-Waste Recycling Program collection site. E- Vermont's new electronic law bans the landfill disposal of electronic waste. The State provides collection of certain electronics and provides for the disposal.
  - o Televisions, computers, monitors, printers and computer peripherals.
    - No charge.
    - There are flyers available at the transfer station for more information on the proper disposal of electronics and protecting your personal data.

#### Vt. Lamp Recycling Program.

- The following items are accepted at the transfer station. There is no charge to recycle the items listed below. These items will be collected weekly at the transfer station and stored in containers to be shipped to an appropriate approved disposal site. These items contain mercury and are no longer accepted in our regular waste stream or at any landfill.
  - o 4 & 8 ft. Fluorescent light tubes.
  - o CFL's (Compact energy efficient bulbs.)
  - o U-tubes, Circle tubes and HIDs
  - o Thermometers containing mercury.
  - o Manometers / barometers containing mercury.
  - o Household thermostats.
  - o Button sized batteries. (such as used in watches)

#### Lead acid batteries / No charge.

o Recommend that when you purchase a new battery that you return your old battery to the retail service that you bought the new battery. This is a service they should provide and you should receive a credit towards the cost of your new battery.

#### **Open Top Container / Construction Debris / Bulky Items:**

#### > Disposal Fees:

o Debris other than sheetrock / shingles. \$45.00 cu/yd. o Sheetrock and asphalt singles. \$75.00 cu/yd.

- Painted wood, plywood, particle board.
- Pressure treated, solid insulation, paneling.
- Wooden doors.
- Non- asbestos flooring.
  - Site operator will pro rate the charge based on portion of cubic yard being dumped into the container.

0	Sofas containing wood or metal.	\$30.00
0	Upholstered chairs/ recliners containing wood or metal.	\$20.00
0	Mattresses / Box springs containing metal or wood.	\$10.00

Note: The above costs can be reduced if <u>you</u> remove all metals and covering materials. The clean wood can go to the stump dump and the metal can go into the metal container and there would be no charge to dispose of these two waste materials. The cloth and filler material can go in the regular trash using a town bag. The above fee charges are to cover the cost if the operator has to strip the items of clean wood and metal. These materials are not allowed in the construction debris container.

o Room size rugs and carpet foam pads. 8'x 10' and larger. \$10.00 Must be rolled up and tied. \$ 4.00 o Scatter rugs rolled up. Per rug. o Vinvl Pools / Tents. Must be rolled up and tied. \$6.00 o Sink / Toilet bowl \$6.00 o Tub / Shower Stall \$10.00 o Furniture \$7.00 Lamp table / Bed \$12.00 Dresser

### **Closed Top Container (Compactor):**

- > All household wastes. This waste stream has to be in a town approved blue bag with the town logo.
- ➤ Cost of town bags: \$1.70 per bag. \$17.00 per sleeve of 10.
- > Bags can be purchased at:
  - o Town Office, Towle's Market, Laperle's IGA
- Paint cans / Oil based must be empty. Latex paint must have dried. No liquid residuals allowed.

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#### Metal Container:

> This container is for metals only. There is no charge to use this container.

- > All appliances containing Freon will need to have the Freon removed by a licensed plumber. Appliance will have to be tagged by plumber stating this has been done.
- > All motors will need the fluids removed.

Open first two Saturday's in January for the disposal of Christmas trees and other clean wood waste.

- Authorized Materials Allowed for Disposal At The Stump Dump:
  - o Road, bridge or highway construction debris.
  - o Concrete, bricks, masonry, mortar. Or other inert materials
  - o Lawn and gardens wastes.
  - o Stumps, brush, untreated wood.
    - Untreated wood means only clean wood that contains no paints or chemicals. The following are not accepted:
      - ⇒ Veneers, particle board, treated wood, stained wood. Any wood that has been treated with a chemical or paint product.
      - ⇒ All treated wood is accepted at the transfer station.

Any questions on what can be disposed of at the Stump Dump ask the operator.

#### **UPDATES**

The Town of Canaan-West Stewartstown wastewater plant and pump station upgrade should be back underway in May, if the weather allows. The project is anticipated to be completed by the end of October this year.

Canaan Fire District #1 is completing the planning on the upgrade to the water system which will be a major project to improve the water quality, provide adequate fire storage and fire protection with the replacement of some of the water mains as well. The planning and design should be completed by May of 2015 with construction activity to begin in mid-summer. The District will be looking for grant and loan funding through the USDA and the State of Vermont. At some point this year a bond vote will be necessary to be able to apply for and secure funding for the project.

#### HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION INFORMATION

What is Household Hazardous Waste and how do we recognize this waste stream? Information was taken from the Waste Management Div. of VT. DEC.

Household Hazardous Waste is common household products that exhibit the characteristics of hazardous waste. As a result these products may be harmful to human and or the environment. Many of these products are very common and are usually purchased from local hardware, automotive, and grocery stores. These products can be used and found in our house, in our garages, on our lawns and in our gardens.

Because these products are so common and easy to purchase, many people forget that these products can be extremely harmful to their health or the environment.

For example, common household products like toilet bowl and oven cleaners can potentially cause burns, blindness, nausea, and shortness of breath.

Automotive products such as gasoline, oil, and antifreeze can be extremely harmful to the environment. According to the EPA, just one gallon of used oil can pollute one million gallons of drinking water. Used oil that ends up in Vermont's waterways can threaten aquatic life. Antifreeze can be extremely toxic to children and pets, potentially causing liver and brain damage, and cardiac failure.

Lawn and garden products such as pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers can be washed off lawns and gardens by the rain, and ultimately end up in water supplies and surface waters. These products can kill fish, non-target insects, and can bioaccumulate in the environment causing harm to animals. One infamous example is the pesticide DDT causing major health problems in birds of prey.

#### How Do I Know if a Product is Hazardous?

Products that contain potential harmful ingredients are required to provide a label that informs you why the product is hazardous, the harm it could cause to humans, ways to avoid exposure, and the necessary first aid procedures in the event of an accidental exposure.

Reading the label thoroughly and closely following the instructions for use may prevent an exposure situation. The label will provide information on safety gear for the application. It will also provide instructions on choosing the best conditions for use. Included on this label will be a combination of a product's Hazardous characteristics, and Key signal words to alert the user of potential dangers.

#### **Hazardous Characteristics**

The hazardous characteristics are toxic, corrosive, reactive, explosive, and flammable / ignitable.

Toxic means that it is potentially poisonous if eaten, breathed, or absorbed through the skin. Examples include pesticides and antifreeze. Corrosive means that it can burn or destroy other materials including living tissue. Examples include toilet bowl cleaner and Photographic fixer solution.

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#### Flea Markets and Bake Sales to Benefit Recreation Park

For the third year running, the Canaan Community Recreation Park members will be hosting fundraising events to help raise money to replace the existing playground equipment. Some of the events will include flea markets and bake sales. Participants are able to rent a  $10 \times 10$  foot space for \$10.00, inside of which they can sell their flea market items. Vendors keep every penny they earn during the events, only the cost to rent the space goes to benefit the Canaan Community Recreation Park fund. Last year's sales included food and a variety of yard sale items.

This year's events will be held on the following Saturday's May 24th, June 14th, July 12th and September 13th from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in the Canaan Fletcher Park by the library. If it is raining, these events might be rescheduled. Vendors will be able to begin setting up their booths at 8:00 a.m.

We welcome donations of re-salable items which can be dropped off at any of our flea markets or cash donations will also be accepted.

With grant requests written by Librarian Deborah Gadwah -Lambert, both Foundations have provided repeat funding for afterschool programming.

A large portion of this funding is being used for the library's STEAM Club held Thursday afternoons after school.

STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art & Math) is a philosophy not a program. According to the Afterschool Alliance, "Nearly 80% of future careers will require some STEM skills.

A stimulating STEM education is essential for developing the basic analytical, problemsolving and critical thinking skills central to academic achievement and workforce readiness in the 21st century. Schools can't tackle this issue by themselves. Children spend less than 20% of their waking hours in school. Afterschool programs offer both additional time and the opportunity to diversify the ways that students experience STEM learning.

Afterschool programs complement and supplement school-day learning and are well-positioned to engage and motivate participants. By offering innovative hands-on, project-based learning, STEM fields come alive for youth." (http://www.afterschoolalliance.org/STEM.cfm)

Movie afternoons that compliment books being read during Walk to Read at school, gamers club and new cooking activities are planned.
