What is Green Up Day? Green Up Day, always the first Saturday in May, was launched in 1970 by Governor Deane Davis. In 1979, the non-profit organization Green Up Vermont was formed to carry on the tradition of Green Up Day. It is an annual statewide event, when over 22,000 volunteers come together to remove litter from Vermont's roadsides and public spaces.



DOG LICENSES



The **deadline** is **April 1st** to register your dog before late fees are applied.

Per state law—all dogs 6 months or older are to be licensed every year.

Please bring in your most recent rabies certificate.

If you no longer own your pet contact the Town, so your name will be removed.

If you do not by that date the Animal Control Officer will pay you a visit.

CLEANUP OF EXCREMENT

Responsibility for cleanup of excrement. The owner of any animal shall be responsible for the prompt removal of any excreta deposited by his or her animal(s) off the owners premises. Failure to remove such excreta shall be considered a violation of the ordinance. The fine for a violation of this section of the ordinance shall be \$50 with a waiver fee of \$25. A written warning shall be issued for the first violation of this section of the ordinance.

LEASH LAW

Responsibility for Leash Law: "At large" shall be intended to mean off the premises of the owner, and not immediately under the control of the owner or a member of the immediate family either by leash, cord, chain or otherwise. Failure to follow the leash law shall be considered a violation of the ordinance.

Selectboard Quarterly Report

The Select Board would like to thank Gregory Noyes for his years of service to the town in his many capacities from School Board through Select Board over the years and, also to Bob Lee for his years of service to the Zoning Board. Welcome to the Select Board to Alfred Buckley. We would also like to thank everyone who took on appointments to committees that help the town out. We have Alfred Buckley on the Cemetery Committee; Paul Lyons on the Rec Park Committee; Eugene Reid as the Inspector of Lumber; Tom Caron on Connecticut River Joint Committee; Yvon Doyon on the Community Forest Committee; Noreen Labrecque as the Revolving Loan Committee Treasurer; Julie Nadeau on the Zoning Board of Adjustments; Harland Crawford as Emergency Management Coordinator; Wayne Washburn as Animal Control Officer; Morgan Wade on Community Forest Committee, and Robert Couture as Ambulance District Representative. With that being said, we still have a few openings that need to be filled and they are on the Zoning Board, a Green Up Chairperson, Connecticut River Joint Committee.

There is also a need for someone to consider learning from Harland Crawford the Emergency

Management Coordinator position because he wants to retire from that, but it would be nice to have

him work with them this year.

Thank you for passing the budgets for the upcoming year and working with us. Now that we are getting into spring mode we have posted and closed some roads for mud season. Please follow the signs or it costs the Town money to repair the damage that is done on the roads but if someone were to get caught it will end up costing them. There is another issue on roads, and that is trucks on the town roads. The Vermont Agency of Transportation has a weight permit form for trucks running on town roads, which is a minimal fee of \$5 per truck or \$10 for a fleet which needs to be accompanied by a certificate of liability insurance. This permit is registered with the Town Office. The Hall Stream bridge has been posted for 24,000 pounds and this needs to be followed because that bridge is deteriorating and is a future project the town will need to address.

We will be meeting with our State Reps on what items they are voting on in Montpelier that will be affecting us in the near future. One item is the watershed along the Connecticut River. The Town of Canaan does have a few streams running into the river. The main concerns are the costs that the State will be saddling the Town with. Another item is getting the composting up and running without having to spend untold thousands of dollars to do so.

Our meetings are held every other Monday and you can attend in person or catch it on zoom. The minutes are always posted on the town website. Thanks again for your support and hopefully this year will be different than 2020. Keep safe and healthy.

FROM THE LISTERS

In a typical year, it is the work of the listers to inspect any property which has had material changes from the prior years and to determine an assessment for the upcoming Grand List year based on the status of your property as of April 1st (4/1/2021). Given the COVID-19 virus concerns, we are not able to complete these usual interior inspections at this time.

We very much appreciate the property owners that cooperated and will continue to cooperate to help us with this task for 2021.

ANNUAL VERMONT HOMESTEAD DECLARATION

By Vermont law, property owners whose homes meet the <u>definition of a Vermont homestead</u> must file a Homestead Declaration annually by the April 15th filing deadline. If eligible, it is important that you file so that you are correctly assessed the homestead tax rate on your property.

Please remember to file both the 2020 Form HS-122 Homestead Declaration and 2021 Schedule HI-144 Household Income before the April 15th filing deadline.

In Vermont, all property is subject to education property tax to pay for the state's schools. For this purpose, property is categorized as either non-homestead or homestead. A homestead is the principal dwelling and parcel of land surrounding the dwelling, owned and occupied by the resident as the person's <u>domicile</u>.

All property is considered *non-homestead* (formerly "nonresidential"), unless it is declared as a *homestead*. The education property tax rate levied on non-homestead property differs from the rate levied on homestead property. It is your responsibility as the property owner to claim the property as a homestead if you meet, or expect to meet, the following requirements:

- You are a Vermont resident
- You own and occupy a homestead as your domicile as of April 1, 2021

Please note: If you meet these requirements, except that your homestead is leased to a tenant on April 1, 2021, you may still claim it as a homestead if it is not leased for more than 182 days in the 2021 calendar year.

NONHOMESTEAD PROPERTY

Property is considered non-homestead if one of the following applies:

- ◆Your property is leased for more than 182 days out of the calendar year.
- The property is used exclusively for a commercial, including rental, purpose.
- ◆The property is used for a second home, camp, vacation, or summer cottage.

A big thank you to the Canaan voters for the \$2,000 voted in on March 2, 2021! Your tax dollars will be spent wisely towards the Town of Canaan.


