SELECTBOARD QUARTERLY REPORT

CANAAN HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The work on the Hall Stream Bridge is well underway and is slated to be completed by October 31st, 2023. The contractor, Austin Construction, has done an excellent job! The project has been seamless if it wasn't for the flooding and high rivers that have plagued us and the rest of the State all summer. We thank everyone for their cooperation and caution as the project has been completed. Richard has been busy fixing the roads this past quarter. With the help of ARPA funds, Richard was able to complete much needed maintenance on many Class IV roads. These roads don't always get the attention they need, due to budget constraints, but with the help of ARPA and a State of Vermont grant they were able to get fixed without any tax dollars. As the colder months set in, the highway department has been busy doing their final grading of the year and have put chloride on all of the gravel roads.

CANAAN SEWER DEPARTMENT


April has been busy keeping everything running smoothly at the Treatment Plant. We were lucky that the heavy rain didn't affect our roads, but the excess rain water has kept the sewer system running a full capacity. Due to the excess rain water, one of the pumps failed and a new one was needed.

GENERAL BUSINESS

The Town's Local Hazard Mitigation Plan is set to expire at the end of the year, so the Town has been working with OPH Consulting to revise the plan. We sought public input through an online survey and want to thank everyone who took the time to complete it. We hope to use all of the input to redraft our plan. The board has decided to make a remote option available for all of our meetings. We understand that it can be difficult to attend meetings in person and wanted to give our townspeople a second option. This project was also funded with ARPA money.

The State of Vermont Building and General Services launched a grant program that is aimed at increasing the energy and heat efficiency of municipal buildings. Zach applied on behalf of the Town and signed the Town Office, Town Garage, and Library up for the program. Last month, Canaan was the first in the State to receive free energy audits for the three buildings. Once the results of the audits are in, up to \$500,000 will be available to the Town to repair these three buildings.

Due to safety concerns, the Town has split Lake View Drive into two separate roads. Lake View will remain the name for the 800 foot section off from VT RTE 114. The section off from Dubeau Road will now be called Hidden Acres Drive. This change was made because the middle portion of the looped road is no longer passable.

A safety reminder

Check and replace the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide (CO) alarms. Ensure they are working correctly, and replace the batteries. As the cold sets in and many start up their gas-fired furnaces, fireplaces, portable heaters, etc., for the first time, carbon monoxide poisoning risks increase dramatically. Replace any smoke alarm unit that is older than ten-years. Replace any CO alarm unit that is older than five-years. Following this schedule can mean the difference between life and death.

SOLID MATERIALS

Your private or municipal system can process only toilet paper, which is designed to fall apart rapidly.

Never flush household solid waste such as paper, cloth, or plastic film, even if the package says it's "flushable." Those "flushable" wipes are a leading cause of serious clogs - never flush them!

These items don't dissolve. They mix with fats, oils, and greases, creating clogs that require costly repairs. They can also cause sewage overflows into rivers and lakes.

SOLID MATERIALS DISPOSAL

Toss household solid waste materials into the trash for pickup, or take them to your municipal drop-off. Don't try to burn or compost them (except food scraps)!


Food scraps also cause clogs -- and in-sink disposals don't help! Compost them if you can. Vermont law requires that by July, 2020, all food scraps be diverted from landfills to uses like composting and bio-digestion. Your trash hauler will facilitate.

NEVER FLUSH

The following common household items should never be flushed:

- Paper towels
- Disposable diapers
- Tampons & applicators
- Sanitary napkins
- Hair
- Rags
- Dryer lint
- · Cleaning/disinfectant wipes
- Cigarette butts
- · Q-Tips
- · Dental floss
- Bandages
- Condoms
- Cotton balls
- Facial tissues
- Flushable wipes
- Candy wrappers

CANDY



FATS, OILS, & GREASES

Never pour fats, oils, or greases (a.k.a. FOGs) into sink, toilet, or storm drain!

When they solidify, FOGs impair performance and require pumping or replacement of small septic systems. FOG clogs in public sewer pipes and pumps cause breakdowns that result in sewer overflows and costly repairs. Either way, you pay.

FOGs combine with solid materials - see opposite side - and create "fatbergs." These horror-story clogs cost New York City taxpayers \$20 million a year. Some towns in Vermont pay up to \$40,000 in avoidable clog repairs.

In-sink disposals do not dissolve FOGs!

Don't put FOGs into compost. They can attract pests and slow the composting process.

For more information on damage caused by clogs, do a web search for "fatbergs" lots of wonderfully gross videos!

FOG SOLUTIONS

Bacon Grease & Deep-Fry Oil:

- Save in a jar and re-use. Do a web search for "what to do with bacon grease" for great food recipes and advice on how to make soap, candles, lip balm, bird food, and more.
- Let cool until solidified, then wrap and dispose of in your trash.
- When warm, pour into a sealable jar or directly into your trash bag among absorbent materials.
- Wipe warm pans with a paper towel before washing; toss towels in trash.

Regular Frying & Salad Oil:

- Wipe all frying pans when butter, fat, or oil is still warm, then wash.
- Wipe salad bowls before washing.
 Use paper towels and dispose of them in the trash.





Say goodbye to blue bags and say hello to stickers!

The Selectboard has been looking into alternative ways to comply with the State of Vermont's mandate that all transfer stations operate under a pay-as-you-go system. This was sparked after the last batch of blue bags was incredibly defective. After much research, the Selectboard has decided to get rid of the blue bags and go to a sticker model. The stickers, pictured below, will be suitable for one regular-size kitchen bag, between 13 and 20 gallons. All you have to do is affix a sticker to your garbage bag, and you are good to go. The stickers will be bright yellow and be a 3" x 3" square that will easily stick to any garbage bag you have. This program should roll out in early December or January. More information to come as the time comes closer. Make sure to follow our Facebook Page, visit our website, and check the paper for the price of the stickers and where to purchase them.





Recycling Updates:

Due to a lack of workforce, the Coos County Recycling Center requires all member towns to separate their recyclables. Currently, you are not required to separate your plastic or metal recyclables. They go into their respective containers. When the recycling center picks up our containers, they must dump the recyclables and sort through them. This can be highly time-consuming. This change will go into effect on January 1, 2024, but may be rolled out sooner. Once rolled out, residents must start separating their plastic into three categories and their metal into two. The metal is the easiest and must be divided into aluminum and steel. Examples of aluminum cans would be soda and beer cans, whereas steel cans would be vegetable and soup cans. The plastic must be divided into #1 PETE or PET, which are clear plastic bottles, #2 HDPE Multicolored Solid, and #2 HDPE Natural, Cloudy Plastics. Examples of what goes in each category can be found below, or look for the recycling symbol on your item.

How to Dispose of Refrigerators, Freezers, and Air Conditioners?

Thanks to Sylvain Lamontagne, NRRA has agreed to remove the freon from appliances at our transfer station. We will be partnering with the Coos County Transfer Station to get the minimum number of appliances for NRRA to come up. All households will be allowed to dispose of any freon containing appliance for \$10 per appliance. If you have any questions please direct them to the Selectboard or Transfer Station Attendants.







TOWN OF CANAAN PARKING BANS



Effective December 1, 2023 through April 1, 2024 between the hours of 11:00 P.M. and 7:00 A.M. it is unlawful to park on all streets and roads in Canaan and Beecher Falls (this includes Town Roads and Vermont Routes 102, 114 and 253).

SNOW REMOVAL

No person, other than an employee in the performance of their official duties as authorized by the Agency of Transportation or the Selectboard, shall plow onto the traveled way, shoulder or sidewalk of a State Highway or a Class 1, 2 or 3 Town Highway (V.S.A. T23 Section 1126a.)

NOTICE TO RESIDENTS

The Canaan Selectboard would like to remind Town residents that, despite the best efforts of the Town road crew not to do so, sometimes items within the Town highway right-of-way get damaged, either by snow removal or other highway maintenance equipment. The Town is not responsible for damages obtained within this 25 foot from center of road. The Selectboard is asking that residents beware before leaving or placing objects such as vehicles, fences, trees, signs, etc. within these boundaries. Objects may be removed at the owner's expense.


